director's message by peter sau

In the last two years, I have grown highly aware of the lack of professional disability arts in Singapore. Project Tandem is thus set up as a cost-free theatre training platform for D/deaf and disabled emerging artists.

I believe a community of such professionally trained performers can be a great force for a paradigm shift in Singaporean theatre, and become our creative asset partaking in the growing international exchange of disability-led arts practice, which is remarkable for its progressive force, artistic re-imagining of theatre traditions and lively aesthetic debates. This would break homogeneity and allow new perspectives of creating and presenting artistic work.

No longer should D/deaf and disabled people and their conditions (invisible or otherwise) be perceived in the realm of survivor re-enactments, inspirational and heroic icons, or figures of tragedy. Instead, it should be realigned to become a celebration of true diversity of the human condition, and a recognition of our own vulnerabilities and futures. We are *not* non-disabled; instead, we are *not*-yet disabled.

We should also rethink whether non-disabled actors should command the limelight and be awarded for their 'believable' performances by performing D/deaf and disabled characters on stage. Instead of assuming artists with disabilities 'can't do much things', we should embrace that they can do things differently.

Take away from them the labels and the stigma, and their genius would be revealed, to enable all of us more ways to experience the world.

Currently studying at LASALLE College of the Arts, **Claire**'s dream is to become a musical theatre actress. Though it will be a long journey, she believes with every song and every dance she performs, her passion would only grow stronger. To her, theatre is about creating value in someone else's life - to make people more
